**A home blood pressure machine will help you and your doctor understand how well your blood pressure is controlled. When choosing a cuff, there are a few helpful features to keep in mind:**

### Strongly recommended:

- Automatic measurement by pushing a button
- Devices certified to be accurate (validated) by respected organizations
- Upper arm measurement with a cuff that is the right size for you
- Large digital screen

### Optional/preferred:





- Memory to store readings with dates and times
- Bluetooth option to allow readings to be sent electronically
- Ability to average readings taken over 10 minutes
- Includes two user settings if needed
